Beginning in Fall 2015, the following grading profile was used for courses with more than 30 students. Up to one-third of grades in the A and B range could be designated as a "plus" grade and up to two-thirds of grades in the C range could be designated as a "plus" grade.

All courses with 30 or fewer students, seminars and intensive programs are required to have a median grade of either a B or B+.

Explanatory Note to Winter 2018 Grades

Due to a labour dispute at York University during the 2018 Winter term, Osgoode Hall Law School students had the option, in advance of a final examination or submission of a final paper, to elect that a credit/no credit notation replace a letter grade on their transcript for all of their full year 2017-2018 classes and Winter term 2018 classes, or for certain specific classes significantly disrupted by the labour dispute. These credit/no credit notations are additional to those provided for clinical programs and law journals that are normally graded on a credit/no credit basis. Due to this credit/no credit option, course averages and class sizes were not run for any full year 2017-2018 classes or for any Winter term 2018 classes.

Explanatory Note to Winter 2020 Grades

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, for the Winter 2020 term a mandatory credit/no credit evaluation scheme replaces letter grades in Osgoode Hall Law School Juris Doctor (JD) courses.

Explanatory Note to Winter 2021 and Winter 2022 Grades

Due to the adverse impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on student well-being, Osgoode Hall Law School JD students had the option, after the release of grades, to apply to receive a credit/no credit notation to replace a single grade, arising from any course, seminar or program that was substantially delivered in the Winter 2021 and Winter 2022 terms and not otherwise assessed on a credit/no credit basis. Applications were assessed on medical, compassionate or equitable grounds and approved by the Associate Deans and/or the Assistant Dean or other decanal designate. This policy was made available to recognize the disproportionate hardship that many students experienced as a result of the pandemic.
